February Meeting Highlights

Our February 11th Zoom meeting featured a presentation by Michelle Brooks, a Third Grade Teacher at Village Elementary in Georgetown. She first discussed how the book *The 5 Love Languages of Children* by Gary Chapman and Ross Campbell has been used throughout the school to build relationships among the adults and students. With clear expectations and individuals' awareness of their own behavior, the learning environment is stronger. There are five needs that we all have and when we discover what a student needs, the teacher can show genuine care to better support each child. The first point is *physical touch* that can be as simple as a high five or a pat on the back. *Words*, such as, "you are special," and "you did a great job," are reassuring for some children. Of course many students like a small *gift*; those stickers we give out are important! Service might involve doing something for the child like an action that helps him or her feel more important within the classroom. When a teacher can share *quality time* with a student, that undivided attention is what a child may need most. Michelle also talked about Enneagrams, nine personality characters, that shows a person's dominant strength. These are: 1) Moral Perfectionist, 2) Supportive Advisor, 3) Successful Achiever, 4) Romantic Individualist, 5) Investigative Thinker, 6) Loyal Guardian, 7) Entertaining Optimist, 8) Protective Challenger, 9) Peaceful Mediator. These nine points are arranged in a circle and then lines of connection from the dominant characteristic to four other types help us see a more complex and complete picture of our roles and who we can seek out to balance our perspectives. The meeting was a positive exploration of how to support our students and strengthen our own self awareness.

She discussed the importance of students turning to one another to talk about the math problems and helping one another in discovery learning. Mandy is also the Teacher Certification Coordinator at Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas.

Member Spotlight

Faith Unger

I began my first teaching job in September 1971, teaching a self-contained classroom of 30 sixth graders. It was not for the faint of heart! I may have taught them subject matter, but they taught me about life. Most of them were from large families and had lots of life experience. I was experiencing my first pregnancy that year, and they would often give me advice on that journey! Many of them had skills and hobbies that were unique to me—quilting, wood carving, and needle work are some that I remember. I organized a crafts fair for them to show off their work in the school community. At Christmas time we chopped down our own Christmas tree and made ornaments together, incorporating the subject learning into those activities. I taught there another year, and then we moved to a different community and I took time off to raise children.

Many years later I returned to teaching in Jarrell, Texas. It was again a self-contained classroom of sixth graders. I traded my science for social studies classes, thus teaching both fifth grade and sixth grade social studies. I also taught music class. I had two of my best teaching years there, receiving great support from the school administration, parents, and fellow teachers. Most of my students had not been outside of their small geographical area, so I promoted a field trip to see Canyon of the Eagles and ride the boat out to see eagles. What a rich experience for all of us. These excursions became good fodder for our classroom lessons.

I taught four years in Palacios, Texas. It was a fifth grade team teaching opportunity at which I taught math, science, and social studies. Palacios at that time was one of the wealthiest school districts in Texas, quite the opposite of Jarrell! The University of Houston extension campus in Victoria offered opportunities for extending our classroom teaching by working with faculty and students on special learning projects. One I thoroughly enjoyed was that of using fun games to teach math. Palacios had a marine learning center where classroom learning could be augmented with experiences on the water front and adjoining lab.

I finished my Master's degree and certification in teaching the Gifted and Talented. Round Rock school district offered me a position teaching Language Arts and Math to elementary students identified as gifted. After a couple of years, I transferred to a different campus, still teaching the gifted and talented, but now just language arts, which is my favorite subject to teach. It was during this time that I had an article published, and together the students and I did Writing Workshop. There were so many opportunities to blend writing, reading, and social studies together, often using a historical event to link the work together. Because students were usually with me for several years we became like family and sometimes my reading choices were based on specific needs of the children. When a student's parent was experiencing end of life, we read *Bridge to Terrabithia*. When we all needed to appreciate diversity, we read *Sign of the Beaver*. For our spelling work, we learned vocabulary by parsing out the words, looking for common roots, suffixes, and prefixes. Many years after they had left my teaching realm, I received an invitation to lunch with a group of elementary school alumni heading off to college. They wanted me to know how valuable the vocabulary work was to successful SAT scores!

After retiring from teaching, I worked for a local non-profit recruiting and coordinating volunteers for seven years. Next, I went to work for AGE of Central Texas to develop a new program there, CaregiverU. The vision was to form a collaboration of Partner Agencies, each with its own instructors. CaregiverU would then prepare these instructors to teach evidence based courses to older adults and family caregivers.

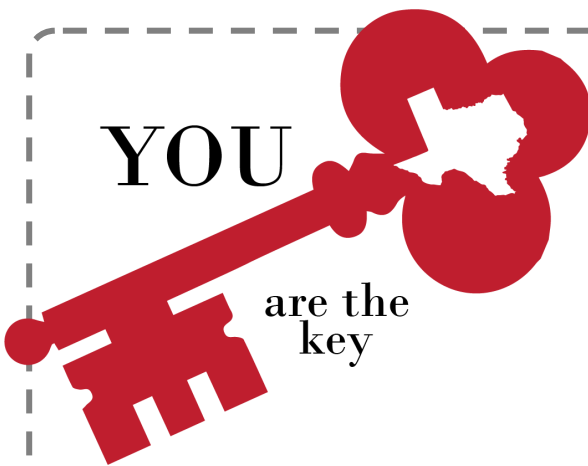
