TSO State Scholarships Available

Whether you are currently teaching or are enjoying the good life, you are all life-long learners and may have a desire to hone your personal or professional skills. Now is the time to take advantage of some wonderful learning opportunities and develop your application for a TSO State Scholarship. Scholarship applications are due to the Chair of the TSO Scholarship Committee on March 1.

Scholarships are available for active members of DKG for:

- 3, 6, or 9 credit hours of graduate or undergraduate courses; members who are currently teaching may also apply for coursework toward certification in an education area other than a Texas teaching certificate, such as Bilingual or Special Education certification
- 9 hours for doctoral courses or enrollment for dissertation
- Educational travel (Maetha Griffin Weatherby - requires matching funds)
- Life-long Learner (formerly Adult Education) for 3 hours study; Road Scholar (non-ASTEF), Go Ahead Tours, and other structured tours or travel opportunities with **educational components** that would enhance the applicant's personal or professional goals; Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at UT Austin for adults 50+ (Forum, Lamp, Nova, Quest, Sage); personal and professional enrichment courses; research; non-DKG conferences; workshops; or other lifelong learning activity
- Mini-grants for non-traditional professional development such as **non-DKG** conferences, workshops, and research

Aspiring Educator Grants, administered by ASTEF, are also available for **non-DKG** members and DKG **Collegiate** members to work toward an undergraduate education degree and Texas teacher certification. These grants may also provide funds for **Alternative Teacher Certification** for women who already have a degree in a field other than education and who desire to become a teacher.

Member Spotlight—Linda Holt

All I ever wanted to be growing up was a teacher. I would take papers my teacher was throwing away and go home and play school. I was the first in my family to go to college. My family didn't have the means to pay for my education, so I did. I chose Southwest Texas State because of their outstanding reputation as a school for teachers, and I could also commute from my home in South Austin. I worked many jobs throughout college to help pay tuition. I did retail, tutoring, and was even a check collector. As a check collector, I would call people who wrote bad checks to different businesses and convince them to come in and pay their debt along with a \$15 fee. It was there that I learned the power of being positive. Many of these people were just down on their luck and needed someone to listen. They *almost* always came in to take care of their obligation. As a tutor, I saw firsthand the diverse learning styles of individuals. I was able to design lessons specifically for their learning styles. Retail taught me organization and the power of penny pinching...minimum wage was \$3.75!



I graduated from Southwest Texas State University (now Texas State) in December 1988. I worked as a substitute that spring. My first interview for a teaching position was with Marilyn Gregory at Lake Travis Elementary! She believed in me and saw potential. (She still does!) I began my teaching career in 1989. I had the amazing opportunity to work with Marilyn Gregory as my mentor. We taught kindergarten together for many years. I remember sitting around the lunch table and Marilyn would always talk about Delta Kappa Gamma. This was my first introduction to DKG. Through the years Marilyn continued to be my teacher, friend, mentor, guidance counselor...you name it...she was always there for me...and still is! Throughout my career, I have had the opportunity to help open two elementary schools in Lake Travis ISD. In 1999, I helped open Bee Cave Elementary and taught kindergarten. At Bee Cave, I had the opportunity to watch my own boys grow and learn. In 2014, I helped open West Cypress Hills. I am still there today. I taught kindergarten for 23 years, and have currently been teaching 2nd grade for the last 4 years.

I met my amazing husband, Chip, and his daughter, Lauren in 1996, and we were married in 1997. We had Haston in 1998. Our twins, Hunter and Harrison, were born in 2001. We love to travel. Our favorite places to go are Colorado and Mexico. I still love to travel with my family, but as they are getting older, it is more difficult to coordinate schedules. Last summer was the first time Chip and I took a trip together, just the 2 of us! We went to Costa Rica. It was AMAZING!



In addition to traveling with Chip, I am incredibly blessed to be a part of his amazing family. Chip has 4 sisters, and one of their traditions is to take a "Girls' Trip" together every summer with their mom. We continue this tradition today. Chip's mom is now 91, and the dynamics of our trips have changed over the years, but it is still an amazing time to get together and enjoy being a family. We cook, play games, and still manage to get in a little shopping.

When I began my teaching career, some of our Delta Kappa Gamma sisters were not even born, and many had already retired. This is one thing that makes Delta Kappa Gamma so extraordinary. We have the unique opportunity to be influenced by so many generations of great women educators! I am excited to see where the next 25 years in DKG takes us all!

National Women's History Month

Women's history was virtually an unknown topic in the K-12 curriculum or in general public consciousness in the 1970's. To address this situation, the Education Task Force of the Sonoma County (California) Commission on the Status of Women initiated a "Women's History Week" celebration for 1978.

The week of March 8th, International Women's Day, was chosen as the focal point of the observance. The local Women's History Week activities met with enthusiastic response, and dozens of schools planned special programs for Women's History Week. Over one-hundred community women participated by doing special presentations in classrooms throughout the country and an annual "Real Woman" Essay Contest drew hundreds of entries. The finale for the week was a celebratory parade and program held in the center of downtown Santa Rosa, California.

By 1986, 14 states had already declared March as Women's History Month. This momentum and state-by-state action was used as the rationale to lobby Congress to declare the entire month of March 1987 as National Women's History Month. In 1987, Congress declared March as National Women's History Month in perpetuity. A special Presidential Proclamation is issued every year which honors the extraordinary achievements of American women. [2] Every year March is designated Women's History Month by Presidential proclamation. The month is set aside to honor women's contributions in American history. The National Women's History Alliance selects and publishes the yearly theme. The 2020 Women's History Month theme is "**Valiant Women of the Vote.**" The theme honors "the brave women who fought to win suffrage rights for women, and for the women who continue to fight for the voting rights of others." Phyllis Richards will be 100 years old on March 30th.

Dr. Phyllis Richards was a visionary leader and researcher in the field of early childhood education and development and worked vigorously to help establish the Head Start program on a national level. She was called upon by President Lyndon B. Johnson's office to help organize the initiative. Within 4 months they got the program off the ground. Dr. Richards has over 60 years of dedicated service in child development and shaping service delivery to children. Her commitment toward ensuring that all children have access to quality early childhood education and mental health services has created long-term impacts for thousands of children. She served as a faculty member for the University of Texas at Austin's School of Human Ecology, Division of Human Development and Family Sciences for forty years. Dr. Richards' work as board member and officer helped make the National Association for the Education of Young Children a major national voice for young children and their families. [1]
